Significant partnerships and collaborator details follow in the chart below.

<p><b>United Way of Northern New Mexico:</b> Multi-year, long term, ongoing Y partner for youth scholarships in support of camp and afterschool care; and main supporter of Española Teen Center.</p>
<p><b>Los Alamos National Laboratory Community Programs Office/LANL Foundation:</b> Annual support for from the Community Programs office for several projects at the YMCA's Española Teen Center, and Los Alamos Teen Center; in 2008 awarded \$25K for cardio wellness room expansion. In 2015, support at Chairman's Round Table level. LANL Foundation provides Benefactors of Youth support for scholarships.</p>
<p><b>Los Alamos Public Schools:</b> Ongoing membership-for-space partnership. LAPS provides space for afterschool and summer camp programming in exchange for school employee membership benefits, that served 204 employees in 2017, and served 271 children in out-of-school-time care.</p>
<p><b>Bandelier National Park, Volunteer Task Force, Delle Foundation &amp; Pajarito Trail fest:</b> In early 2017 these partners provided funding to hire a crew of 9 youth workers for the Y Bandelier Corps. <b>UNM-LA</b> joined the partnership to provide an educational credit for crew members.</p>
<p><b>New Mexico Youth Conservation Corps Commission:</b> Grants in 2018, and from 2008-2016 have provided annual summer employment and job skill training to Española, Pojoaque and Los Alamos youth for trail work. In all these years we have paid out more than \$500,000 in wages. In 2016, we employed 24 area youth to improve community areas. This required partnerships with <b>Los Alamos County</b> and <b>Santa Fe National Forest</b>.</p>
<p><b>Los Alamos Juvenile Justice Advisory Board:</b> Funding to administer prevention and leadership youth programs: Los Alamos Youth Leadership, Safe Prom/Safe Homecoming, 5<sup>th</sup> Quarters and Leader-in-Training retreat.</p>
<p><b>The Delle Foundation:</b> 2000-2018 support for Summer YES (YMCA Earth Services) Corps volunteer-service learning program in Los Alamos.</p>
<p><b>Collaborate /partner for various programs:</b> Los Alamos County Juvenile Justice Advisory Board funds youth development programs: Youth Mobilizers, Safe Prom/Homecoming, and 5<sup>th</sup> Quarters; LAC Open Space Division; LAC Recreation Division for Senior Appreciation Night; partnering with LA Family Council, LA Police Department, Pajarito Environmental Education Center, Volunteer Task Force, Leadership Los Alamos, YMCA of Central NM and YMCA of El Paso.</p>

## **Española YMCA Teen Center 2017 Collaborations and Donors**

**Anonymous:** 2017 gift of \$1,000.00.

**City of Española:** 2007-present, operating contract to run center, now providing \$60+/year toward support.

**Clothes Helping Kids, Inc.:** 2016-2017 support of \$5K for enriching programs and tutoring.

**Con Alma Health Foundation:** \$14K in 2017; \$15K for health activities 2013-2015; \$20K for 2012-13, multiple year past support.

**Cross Connection, Inc.:** \$5K in 2017-2015 for enrichment programming; \$35K in 2014 for healthy, enrichment programs for teens.

**Española Presbyterian Hospital:** 2017 Benefactor of Youth support of \$1,500; 2016 to present, supports annual Harvest Parade by providing food and drinks for all participants; provided snacks, fruit, warm meals and on occasion clothing for teens; financial support to sustain EYTC operations in the community.

**Lineberry Foundation:** \$25,000 support in 2017.

**Los Alamos Medical Center:** \$1000 annual, multiple year program partner.

**Los Alamos National Laboratory, Community Programs Office:** Provided the initial LEGO Mindstorms Robot Kit to jumpstart the robotics program; supportive of STEM initiatives that promote higher learning; invites robotics team to participate in various opportunities to promote program as well as build self-esteem and confidence; have included EYTC in some of their marketing materials; 2013-2015, providing \$2,250 for tutoring and robotics. In 2012, awarded \$5,000 for tutor services, greenhouse and microbiology programs. In 2010 awarded \$6,500 for court improvements. LANL originally provided facility structure to city in 2000.

**Los Alamos National Laboratory Foundation:** 2017 support for \$5,500.

**Lou Santoro, State Farm Insurance:** \$1K in 2016; 2017 support for \$5,000.

**New Mexico Community Foundation, Pojoaque Valley Fund:** Programmatic support since 2009 from \$2.5-\$1K annually.

**New Mexico Youth Conservation Corps Commission:** 2018, 2009-2016, grants of \$150K plus in support of job programs that hire Espanola and Los Alamos youth for public work for community good. Award requires collaboration with **Los Alamos County; Santa Fe National Forest; Los Alamos Juvenile Justice Advisory Board, Volunteer Task Force.**

**Santa Fe Community Foundation:** 2017 and 2014 awarded \$15K for healthy programs for teens.

**Santa Fe County:** \$5k in 2017, \$10K in 2016; \$15K-\$20K in 2014-15 for enrichment programs for Santa Fe County youth; partner since 2013.

**State Farm Insurance Matching Grants:** Matching grants of \$1.5; support of \$1K in 2016; 2013 funding of \$20K for life skills classes, and \$4K in 2014.

**United Way of Northern New Mexico:** In 2017, supported Center with \$38k; in 2016, 2015 and 2014 provided \$25K; multiple past year partner.

**Y Bandelier Corps:** A 2017 partnership between Bandelier National Monument (U.S National Park Service), the Los Alamos based Volunteer Task Force, the Delle Foundation, the Pajarito Trail Fest and The Family YMCA to support 9 positions for youth to learn conservation and preservation, and earn college credit, during an experiential work program for 7 weeks at Bandelier during the summer of 2017.

## 2017 Los Alamos Teen Center Collaborations

Significant partnerships and collaborator details follow in the chart below.

<b>Los Alamos County:</b> Beginning in 2011, annual contract of approximately \$170-332K to operate Los Alamos Teen Center. Partnered with LAC Parks, Rec & Open Space Division for a variety of teen-related events.
<b>Delle Foundation:</b> Provided funds to cover a part-time administrative support and advertising coordinator.
<b>Los Alamos High School/Los Alamos Public Schools:</b> Los Alamos Public Schools staff and teens worked with the Teen Center on Safe Prom, Safe Homecoming, Senior Appreciation Night and promotion of other special events. LAPS Life Skills class brings students on a regular basis to utilize the space as part of their community outings. LATC Youth Mobilizers and Teen Council have worked with students from the LAHS Leadership class for cross-pollination of ideas and events. LAPS staff presented an Underage Drinking/Alcohol Awareness workshop in collaboration with the Youth Mobilizers, and LAPS staff partnered with the Youth Mobilizers to host the film 'Screenagers.'
<b>Juvenile Justice Advisory Board:</b> Funds a variety of events and programs held at the Teen Center. In 2017 JJAB funded 5 <sup>th</sup> Quarters, Safe Prom, Safe Homecoming, Arts & Resiliency, Girls' Circle and Boys' Council, Youth Mobilizers, as well as funding for various outreach, field trips and member engagement events. JJAB's Youth Resource Specialists also met regularly with teens and parents in private meeting rooms at the Teen Center. LATC staff and teen representatives participate on the Board. JJAB also contracts with local Mental Health professional agencies to provide counselors and a teen support group in the Teen Center facility.
<b>Leadership Los Alamos:</b> Sylvan Argo and George Marsden co-chair LLA's Youth Session and host it at the Teen Center facility.
<b>DWI Planning Council:</b> George Marsden is a voting member of the DWI Planning Council.
<b>Teen Court:</b> Sent teens to do community service at Teen Center. This was at times teens' first introduction to the Teen Center and offered connections to the Teen Center community and engagement as members even after community service requirements were met.
<b>Kiwanis:</b> Donated food on a weekly basis.
<b>Los Alamos Community Health Council:</b> Members are strong advocates for teen center and connecting to resources. Recent health profile states the importance of having a safe place for teens to associate in our community. Teen Center Director (Sylvan Argo) is a member of the Council. Los Alamos Teen Center hosted monthly meetings of the Youth Resiliency Subcommittee of the CHC.
<b>Trinity On The Hill Church:</b> Donated \$1000 towards Teen Center Program support.
<b>Los Alamos Community Members:</b> Donated money towards Annual Campaign & ongoing program support. Donated food, art supplies, musical instruments, board games and other in-kind items. Volunteers donated time towards special programs/events.
<b>Los Alamos Nukes and Bombshells Youth Rugby Teams:</b> Hosted team events at the teen. Members of the Rugby team are active at the teen center and work on various projects.
<b>Aaron's Kids Program:</b> Provides non-perishable lunches to teens in need of a meal. Over 60 lunches plus snack items are dropped off weekly at the teen center, and teens know to ask for them if they are hungry.
<b>PEEC:</b> Teens hosted a video game night at PEEC's Planetarium.
<b>Los Alamos Police Department:</b> Officers hosted a DWI awareness activity with impairment goggles and pedal carts.
<b>PAC 8:</b> Partnered with the Teen Center to connect teens to a suicide awareness program creating PSAs for the community. Teens and PAC 8 staff used the Teen Center's recording studio to record original music and voice overs for a variety of PSAs.
<b>Rotary International:</b> Rotary Stars held bi-monthly Rotary Interact (teen) meetings at the Teen Center for the first half of 2017.
<b>United Way:</b> The Teen Center hosted the United Way's Youth Team Hamburger fundraiser.

**Sombrillo:** Teens folded 500 luminaria bags for Sombrillo's annual Luminaria Walk during the winter holidays.

**CB Fox:** Donated in-kind services repairing furniture. Donated seasonal candy.

**Senior Appreciation Night partners:** The Teen Center hosted SAN committee meetings. Event partners included (but are not limited to) LAC Parks & Rec Division, the Y, the Teen Center, Family Council, Youth Activities Center, LAPD, Atomic City Transit, Kiwanis, LAPS Foundation, and the DWI Planning Council.

**Los Alamos Municipal Court:** The Teen Center hosted a 6-week Juvenile Educational Program (Funded by Los Alamos Teen Court – Juvenile Adjudication Fund Grant) designed for the graduated sanction teen court program. Students were referred from Los Alamos Teen Court – Graduated Sanction program, local mental health professionals and drop-ins. The group was open to adolescents in 9th-12th grade.
